A very scarce Halifax imprint; most early almanacs having not survived. With a wealth of information on Halifax in 1826: directions for entering and leaving Halifax Harbour, roads to the principal towns of Nova Scotia (with mileage & names of innkeepers), fire wardens, legal cases & petitions, government members lists, colleges, justices of the peace, dignitaries for all counties in Nova Scotia, and the British Army officers stationed in Nova Scotia & Bermuda (Royal Artillery, Rifle Brigade, 74th & 81st Regiments). The interleaves contain handwritten lists of ships (arriving & leaving from Halifax Harbour?). The former owner's name-Geo. Grafsie (?) and Co.- appears on endpaper & title page.

One of the series "The Canadian Historical Studies. A Library of Historical Research" with a Foreword by General Editor, Lorne Pierce. Amherst's "Journal" of 18 volumes was discovered only in 1925, and Dr. Webster has presented the portion, volumes 8 to 18, that deal with Amherst's service in America. The siege of Louisbourg, the

capture of Forts Ticonderoga and Crown Point, the occupation of Montreal are covered as well as his tenure as Governor General of British North America from 1760 to 1763.

Peel (3) 1515. Preface signed "Napoleon Thompson". Louis Reil, (1844-1885) was born in St. Boniface, Manitoba, the son of Louis and metis Marguerite (Boucher) Reil. He was educated at the seminary in Montreal. In 1869 and again in 1884 he espoused the cause of Metis and was twice elected to the House of Commons. In 1885 at the end of the second Rebellion he was hung in Regina.

Jacob Bailey (1731-1808) was a pioneer missionary of the Church of England in Maine from 1760 to 1779. Remaining loyal to the British Crown during the American Revolution, Reverend Bailey took refuge in Nova Scotia. His diaries give a valuable account of the Loyalist migration of 1782 to 1783. An Appendix gives biographies of some of the prominent clergy Loyalists. Jacob Bailey died in Annapolis, Nova Scotia in 1808.

Note: The "C" of "Chapter Three" (page 35) overlapping, an error found in the earliest copies printed and corrected "probably during the first printing" (Hanff & Greene, 64).

Organized shortly after the outbreak of war as the Ontario Mounted Rifles, it became the 4th CMRs, and was brigaded with the 5th and 6th CMRs in the 2nd Canadian Mounted Brigade, the 5th and 6th CMRs being raised in the Eastern Townships and the Maritime Provinces. Pages 157-336 contain the nominal roll.

Peel (3) 1347. * on the jacket. "Commanding Boulton's Scouts" on the title page. Boulton was the commander of a cavalry unit known as Boulton's Scouts. One of the appendices gives a complete list of the officers and men in the North West Field Force which suppressed the Rebellion.

Sabin 7668. A reprint of the original 1843 edition with a new Preface by the publisher. Consists of two essays read by the author before the American Philosophical Society on American Revolution paper currency. An Appendix lists all the issues and denominations of all the bills of credit issued by Congress. Samuel Breck (1771-1862) was born in Boston and educated there and in France. He was a major figure in the mercantile, philanthropic, and political life of Philadelphia during the first half of the nineteenth century. With an interest in historical and literary affairs, Breck was an active member of the Library Company of Philadelphia, the Philadelphia Athenaeum, the Historical Society of Pennsylvania, and the American Philosophical Society (elected 1838).

Cf. Sabin 9250. Allibone p288. Lieut. General John Burgoyne was engaged in military service in several parts of the world and obtained considerable distinction as an author. He contributed to *The Westminster Guide* and to the celebrated *Probationary Odes*. His Dramatic and Poetical Works, with Memoir of the Author, appeared in 1808, 2vols, 'The various offerings to the Muses, which were presented by an accomplished gentleman and a brave and skillful officer' - Lon. Monthly Review. He is best known for "State of the Expedition from Canada, 1780"

This broadside was meant to entice prospective settlers in Lower Canada to purchase lands owned by the British American Land Company. The company was chartered in 1834 and bought seven hundred thousand acres from the British Crown, hoping to sell the land in lower Canada, which would also have the benefit of boosting the English-speaking population in the region. The lands offered in this broadside announcement were located in the District of Saint Francis, within eighty miles of Quebec and Montreal, "one of the most beautiful, fertile, healthy portions of British America. They are well watered every where, possessed of excellent roads, and diversified with pretty lakes and healthy streams and rivers. The soil is equal in fertility to that of any part of the Continent, the appearance of the Country is highly picturesque, and the climate is eminently salubrious." Most of the company's lands were sold by the early twentieth century. Amicus 1 copy, microfiche.

It outlines the course of the expedition, illustrated with war plans and maps of the different battles and contains information on clothing, troop equipment, the establishment of a commissariat, the organization of medical and ambulance services, logistical problems, statistics on battle casualties and includes an investigation into war claims.

These volumes cover the first year and ten months of the publication. Visual subjects includes; cities, Montreal, portraits, street scene near Liberal headquarters, Parliament Building in Quebec in winter, exhibitions, railways, bridges, politics, downtown building fire in Hamilton, etc. etc. This periodical more than any other contains the quintessential images of nineteenth century Canada (ie. "Horse on Snowshoes - Taken Fifty Miles Up Lievre River, North of Ottawa", (drawn) from a photograph by Henderson), before the wide spread use of the camera. We have a hand written list of illustrations.

The Precs. - Lande 801. T.P.L. 7156. Sabin 85236. Gagnon II-2005. The author was a career soldier and long standing associate of the Duke of Wellington; John Fox Burgoyne, baronet (1782-1871), engineer and army officer, was the eldest of the four illegitimate children of Lieutenant-General John Burgoyne (1723-1792) ("Gentleman Johnny") and Miss Susan Caulfield, an actress. He was also a colleague of the author.

This work was Carmichael-Smyth's official report to the Duke, of his military inspection tour of Canada in 1825 and was printed in limited numbers. The leaf before the title page states "N.B. - This Volume is printed by Desire of His Grace the Master-General, for the use and convenience of Official People only. It is requested it may be considered confidential by those Persons to whom Copies may be sent". The work covers, in some detail, the campaigns against Quebec by Arnold and Montgomery in 1775, Burgoyne's campaign in 1777, and the military and political operations of the War of 1812. In it the author reports on the military defences of Canada and offers recommendations regarding the works and fortifications along the frontier. This North American work is bound with an equally interesting work regarding the military fortifications of the Netherlands written in 1825, following the author's tour of inspection there. A scarce work with an interesting provenance.

In his brief survey of the Church in Canada, the Author shows himself a strong partisan of the Church of England" (T.P.L.). The author spent fourteen years in the service of the Church in Canada and the United States.

An extensive collection of correspondence and treaties presented to the British Parliament under the titles; "Slave Trade" (46 Papers); "Genoa" (10 Papers, October 1811 to March 1815); "Naples" (19 Papers, January 1814 to March 1814); "Italy" (8 Papers, October 1811); "War with America" (9 Papers, June 1812 to November,1 1813); The Person and Family of Napoleon Buonaparte" (April 1814 to August 1814); and "Correspondence on Alliance against France" (2 papers & Treaty copies, April-May, 1815).

The War in America papers concern the War of 1812 and are primarily naval; with the Royal Navy on the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain. Of particular interest are extracts of the proceedings of the court martial of Captain Barclay and others resulting from the Battle of Lake Erie, September 1813.

The slavery papers from 1813 to 1814 containing extracts of treaties between Britain and European countries give an overview of the gradual abolishment of the slave trade. Correspondents include the Duke of Wellington,

Viscount Castlereagh, Henry Wellesley, and Earl Bathurst. The Genoa, Naples and Italy papers relate to risings against the French in 1814 with much of the correspondence by Lord Bentinck. These city souvenir albums of original photographs have become very scarce. Apparently this is the only photographic album from this period, for the city of Ottawa. We have seen this in purple morocco and bright red cloth both of which were issued with eleven plates. I assume this is the earliest issue.

From the tone of the pamphlet, the dispute continued bitterly for years after. He demanded a court martial but died on 5 Jan. 1816, a week before the date set for the trial. "Richardson's narrative account was designed for use in Canadian schools to portray 'the brilliant feats of arms, and sterling loyalty' of the pupils' predecessors, unperturbed by American publications". (Smith). The US accounts contained anti-British sentiments of the day, yet these were the textbooks in use in the schools of Upper Canada. However, the Superintendent of Education was apathetic to Richardsons plan to continue the history in subsequent volumes nor was it adopted for use in schools. There was little demand for the book and he reports that fewer than thirty copies were sold. Some copies were issued gratuitously.

"First Edition. Richardson as a young man was a Canadian officer in the War of 1812 and has written here one of the best accounts of its progress in Canada and across the line in the United States at Detroit, Ft. Wayne, etc. Many documents are included in the narrative which is especially interesting as far as the doings of Tecumseh and his Indians are concerned. The narrative was first printed in The New Era Canadian Chronicle, a newspaper at Brockville, Upper Canada, where Richardson lived. A modern reprint was published at Toronto in 1902.--TWS." Streeter

So opinionated a man as Smith could not keep silent. In 1879, *A Bystander* was once again back in *Canadian Monthly and National Review*. Not only that, but Smith founded and almost entirely alone wrote *The Bystander*, an independent publication with several metamorphoses; as a monthly whose motto was *Not Parity, But the People*, from January 1880 to June 1881; as a quarterly from January through October 1883; and then again as a monthly from October 1889 to September 1890". - Sutherland. *The Monthly Epic. BENTLY, John. A four-page hand-written letter from an American soldier, John Bentley, in Sackett's Harbor, New York, to his wife in Thomaston, Maine, **dated 26th Sept. 1813**, folded in thirds with letter box and postscript on back, 24 x 21cm., some wear or chipping along the folds, somewhat foxed, very good 1,500.00

Correspondence from the War of 1812 is very scarce, particularly from regular soldiers.

John Bentley of Maine writes of an impending attack on Canada "we expect to embark immediately into Canada". This would be the planned dual prong attack to capture Montreal in 1813. - "we shall attack them some say Kingston others at Montreal and others at Prescott". John Bentley appears to be a sergeant - "I cannot get higher than Sergeant or a Quarter Master Sergeant" - and writes of his serving friends including a Lieutenant Downer, the recruiting officer from Thomaston, Maine. Many of the Army were sick from drinking Lake Erie water - "the Lake water is good for drinking but the water near the shore is not so good as all kinds of filth being thrown into it." Bentley discourses on the machinations within his Regiment to fill the Quarter Master Sergeant vacancy and mentions "our Col. E.W. Ripley". This would be Eleazar Wheelock Ripley (1782-1839) establishing Bentley's regiment as the 21st U.S. Infantry. Correspondence from the War of 1812 is very scarce, particularly from ordinary soldiers. This four-page letter is written by a literate man and gives interesting insight into the United States Army on the eve of a very important a battle that the 21st Infantry served a very prominent part in the Battle of Chrysler's Farm on the 11th of November, 1813.

A unique manuscript by Charles Hubback Watson of Stone Castle, Kent of a tour undertaken, with his wife, in 1893. Sailing from Liverpool on April 15, 1893, aboard the Cunard liner "Etruria", landing in New York and traveled to Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington before taking a train to Canada. Watson writes of their trip across Canada on the Canadian Pacific Railway and writes of visits to Montreal, Ottawa, Vancouver, Victoria and on the return trip, Winnipeg, Minneapolis, Chicago, Toronto, Niagara Falls, the Thousand Islands and back to Montreal for the return trip to England via Quebec City. Watson gives extensive, well-illustrated, descriptions of the trip through the Rockies, of a visit to the Chicago World's Fair and Niagara Falls. Of particular interest are the extensive number of photographs, thirty of thirty-four Canadian views are by William Notman of Montreal. (Possibly all are by Notman). There are seventeen American photographs by various photographers. The author writes in a descriptive and anecdotal style making this an engaging travelogue of a three and a half month tour through North America.

A tribute to Wolfe's conquest of Quebec, the work is divided into two parts, the first being his orders to the troops stationed in England and Scotland, part two being his instructions to the troops in Canada, Halifax, Louisbourg, Point Orleans etc. Included also is a brief sketch of Wolfe and the text of the placart he published upon his arrival at Quebec in 1759, requesting the surrender of the Canadians, to whom, he offered "the sweets of peace amidst the horrors of war".

He came to Canada in 1861 and commanded the Red River Expedition in 1870. On his return to England he is believed to have written three articles in Blackwood's that were critical of the Canadian government's failure to make adequate preparations for the force. When the derogatory remarks are deleted from the articles, the account is similar to that given in the present work. He had been greatly impressed by the work of the Canadian voyageurs, and in 1884, when given command of the expedition that ascended the Nile in a vain hope of saving Gordon, he obtained a corps of voyageurs from Canada.

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
