It covers, in some detail, the campaigns against Quebec by Arnold and Montgomery in 1775, Burgoyne's campaign in 1777, and the military and political operations of the War of 1812. The work was designed to

prove, on the evidence of these former wars, the feasibility of the British retaining Canada, by adopting the measures recommended in the Author's Copy of a Report, etc.

A substantial account of a military survey of the environs of St. Johns, made by Col. Debbieg preliminary to the re-fortification of the harbor. Hugh Debbieg (1731/2-1810) boasts one of the most illustrious careers of a British officer in North America. Following a rapid rise in the Royal Engineers, Debbieg served with Wolfe at Louisburg and was present when Wolfe was killed in the Battle of the Plain of Abraham. Debbieg is one of the officers (standing on the left, between Robert Moncton and Simon Fraser) surrounding the dying Wolfe in Benjamin West's

classic portrayal of the "Death of Wolfe." Debbieg took part in the siege of Montreal in 1761, and was present in the attack on St. Johns in 1762. After the British recaptured St. Johns, Debbieg was charged with the reparations of its fortifications, the addition of new defenses, and the charting of the harbor.

In this lengthy letter (approx. 750 words), written a year before his return to Newfoundland as chief engineer in August 1766, Debbieg relates the progress of the survey and justifies his return to England. "It was necessary to make a new survey upon a large scale of the harbour and the environs ... I have also made the proper sections of the ground in order to show in the clearest manner what part (if any upon this harbour) can be fortified ... the taking these sections has been attended with excessive fatigue from the very uncommon ruggedness of the country, as well as from the swarm of flies, which made it sometimes intolerable." After thanking his lordship for the able performance of "the gentlemen sent to assist me," he goes on: "Before those sections could be taken it was unavoidably necessary to cut thro' the woods ... and this has been pretty expensive as those we have now cut amount altogether to 15 miles in length ... it is absolutely impossible to obtain a just knowledge of the situation but by this method ... no project should be put in execution till it has been first examined ... by a consultation of able engineers ... where the author should be present to explain every part of his design ... most things relative to fortification are of too high importance to be left to the decision of a single person; and I have not that confidence in my own abilities ... explanations with the projector of the design ... may produce hints and amendments which frequently escape men of the best judgment ... I intend to return to England when I have finished my report and designs ..." He mentions that he has notified Lord Granby, Master of Ordnance, and in a postscript informs Thoroton that the garrison has been relieved by "the 59th ... the command of this garrison devolved upon Capt. McDonald ... but upon his being indisposed he has ordered me to resume it again."

In the second letter, also to Thoroton, Debbieg airs his grievance over the matter of pay for his Newfoundland assignment. The question of pay was a chronic source of friction with superiors. Debbieg was later court martialed over this issue. He also clashed with Pitt and in 1790 took his grievance to the public. ODNB for a recent full account of Debbieg, DNB for Thornton and Granby.

From 1887 to 1896 he represented West Toronto, as a Conservative, in the Canadian House of Commons. He died at Toronto, on April 15, 1896.

I trust your son will get through safely after having done his duty to his country." The third letter is from Charles Slatford to his father and is signed. The 37th Battalion, C.E.F., was recruited in Halton, Ontario and sailed overseas in November, 1915.

It was supplied by Lady Jane Franklin. He sailed through Davis Street to Melville Bay and to Smith Sound, where he reached the then highest latitude (78 28') in the Arctic on August 27th. Although the expedition lasted only 4 months, the book is among the most important in Arctic literature, as his work furthered the knowledge of the topography and natural science of northern Baffin Bay considerably.
