



We have had many copies of this book but only 1 comparable, (with ads, and being 22cm tall), that being the Beekman Pool copy in Catalogue 172. Of eighteen listings online only two mention ads., however several do not give a collation.



Hill 42. A.B. 851. T.P.L. 477. Lande 935. Sabin 2613. Wagner- Camp 58b:1. Streeter 3705. - Back, who had been on both Franklin expeditions, was sent out to locate Ross, who had



been unreported through three winters. News of Ross's safe return reached Back in April 1833 and he then pursued the expedition's secondary objectives. These were, firstly, to navigate the length of a river supposedly arising in the neighbourhood of the Great Slave Lake and running north to



the Arctic Sea, and then, secondly, to map as much as possible of the sea-coast. He was successful in both objectives, travelling 7,500 miles in total and traversing the full 440-mile length of the river (known as 'Thlueetessy' by the First Nations). The Great Fish River, as Back named it, has since become known as The Back River.



The plates in this set are clean clear strikes; no foxing.

Arctic Bibliography 1241. Belcher led the Admiralty-sponsored five-ship expedition to Wellington Channel in the spring of 1852. Dividing the squadron into 2 parts, with the North Star remaining at Beechey Island as a base, Belcher sailed with the Assistance and the Pioneer under Sherard Osborn through the Wellington Channel. The expedition made numerous discoveries there and subsequent sledging parties



discovered further islands on their journeys westward. At this time, the other two expedition ships, Resolute and Intrepid, rescued the crew of M'Clure's Investigator expedition, also searching for Franklin and the first to travel through the North-West



passage. Belcher finally sailed back towards Lancaster Sound, but the expedition ships were unable to penetrate the pack ice and all were eventually abandoned, the crews returning to the North Star, On his return home, Belcher was court-martialed for his decision to abandon the expedition ships, but was acquitted.


"The City of St. John's presents a very picturesque appearance, being built on the side of a hill with a gradual ascent of about three hundred and fifty feet, overlooking the beautiful harbour, which has the appearance of a lake, after you have passed the narrow entrance. Large hills rise on every side, upon which the fishermen's huts, are scattered here and there, taking from the natural wildnes of the scene. We were hospitably received by the authorities and citizens of St. John's who are very anxious to extend their present limited commercial intercourse with us, and regard the Transatlantic Telegraphic enterprise as a powerful means of bringing about such a result" Harper Monthly, November, 1858.

Condition: The window matt was originally laid down on the margin leaving residue; there is a triangular stain on the left side; two faint columnar stains in the sky (probably from original wood backing boards); there is a quarter inch diameter hole on the upper left side; the text window paper containing the titles, is toned. We can recommend an expert restorer.





T.P.L. 1426. Lande 1582. Sabin 5360. Story p72. Waterston. Bigsby was a British army surgeon and geologist who came to Lower Canada in 1818 as surgeon of a German rifle regiment. He spent six months dealing with an outbreak of dysentery among immigrants in Quebec and at Hawkesbury, Upper Canada. In 1819 he toured Lower and Upper Canada to investigate geological resources and was secretary to the Boundary Commission during the running of the line between Fort William and Lake of the Woods in 1822. He comments on conditions as he saw them, combining description with philosophical musings. The engravings are made from Bigsby's sketches.



"Energetic, well-informed, opinionated, Dr. Bigsby reminisces about his long connection with Canada, first as Army surgeon in 1818, treating typhus victims in Quebec, and at Hawkesbury, Upper Canada, in 1818, next as geologist collecting specimens along the old voyageur route, Ottawa/ Nippissing, then as scientific advisor to the Boundary Commission that drew the line in Lake Huron, 1819, Lakes St. Clair and Erie, 1821 and between Thunder Bay and Lake of the Woods, 1822. In his landscape sketches, Bigsby claims to depict the non- picturesque, the "places Bartlett did not




visit." His verbal descriptions, both of frontier country and of Quebec, Montreal and Toronto, are equally unconventional. Indians in the city, squalid and abject, barked at by the curs in the street; elegant hearse sledges with musical bells marking a winter funeral; frozen milk sold in the markets in cabbage nets: such vignettes attest to his sharp eye. Anecdotes of river travel up the Ottawa, down the St. Lawrence to Kamouraska, by the Nottawasaga to Lake Huron, are capped by stories of rougher travel North of Lake Superior." (Waterston).

By the end of 1874 the publishers had brought out the fourth edition. There were numerous new editions after.

In The Wild North Land, Butler continues his story, retracing a further northern swing through sub-Arctic forests. He made "a winter's walk through the land of stillness"; Athabasa, Peace River, Qu'Appelle, and northern British Columbia. This book begins with a

reprise on Red River, two years after the railroad had helped build a city on the untenanted prairie, with gambling houses, drinking salons, stagecoach and steamboat. New politics, old dogs, and the unending skyline of the true prairie and the "dizzy glory of the mountains" become the focus of this excellent sequel to The Great Lone Land, (1872). Waterston p138.








The author, a former British Army officer, was the brother of the celebrated Major John Cartwright. Between 1770 and 1786, both in partnership with various British merchants and on his own behalf, the author made six expeditions to Newfoundland and Labrador. He traded in fish, seals and furs as well as establishing posts at Hamilton Inlet, Cape Charles and Sandwich Bay. He eventually ceased trading as a result of an increasing number of raids by American privateers, most notably John Grimes. The journal contains much detail of day to day activities and incidents. Cartwright was massively interested




in all aspects of the surrounding country, including the Inuit, five of whom he brought to England, and who were the occasion of his meeting with Joseph Banks. Honesty and curiosity characterized his relationship with the Inuit, as a result of which, he earned their respect and acquired the language. Besides a study of the Inuit language he went some way to compiling a glossary of Newfoundland English. Both Southey and Coleridge admired the Journals, both for their plain subject matter and simplicity of expression.






Hoare was sent by the Department of the Interior to establish the boundaries of the newly declared Thelon Game Sanctuary, survey the muskoxen population and build a warden's cabin. All this to be accomplished on foot, by dogsled and canoe. This edition of A Thelon Odyssey includes the hitherto unpublished 1930-1931 journal along with a reprint of the 1928-1929 journal first published in 1990. It also includes photographs by Hoare, a biographical sketch, maps, editorial material by Hoare's daughter, Sheila Thomson, an extensive bibliography, and other supplementary material that enriches our historical knowledge of this area. - "Hoare and Knox struggled with faulty maps through blizzards, vicious cold, rotten ice, slush, freezing water, and finally clouds of mosquitoes and black flies. They slept in the open, in tents, in makeshift lean-toes, in trapper's cabins, while portaging tons of supplies stored at various caches, by sleigh and canoe. Their journey took them into the country where Hornby had perished just a year before when the caribou failed to arrive.

T.P.L. 4649. National Maritime Museum V1- 762. Story p778. Fitzgerald, 82. George Best's (d.1584?) Account of Frobisher voyages. Etc... see T.P.L. 4649. Best was a navigator, who accompanied all three of Frobisher's expeditions (1576-1578). On the last he was captain of the Jane Anne.

Frobisher's discovery on the shores of Baffin Island of the mysterious "black earth" optimistically presumed to contain gold, resulted in the immediate despatch of a second expedition, under the Queen's patronage, which sailed in 1577. cf. Howgego. pp401-404. This is an adapted and revised edition of the original account of 1578 by George Best. Stefansson has added a substantial amount of supplementary material to Frobisher's original text, including a bibliography, photographs, and a number of appendices dealing with textual history, Eskimo terms, and other contemporary accounts of Frobisher's voyages.






Sabin 25633. - The reports include those of Belcher's expedition during 1852-1853 of the eastern division out of Northumberland Sound, the western division under Kellett at Dealy Island, and those of Pullen and the North Star at Beechy Island (the latter including M'Cormick's boat expedition up Wellington Channel). Also included is Inglefield's report of his voyage of 1853 with the Phoenix and Breadalbane. Western Arctic exploration includes Collinson's expedition through Bering's Strait (of which M'Clure's narrative of 1850-1853 predominates) and those of Frederick, Maguire and Trollope.




The expedition attempted to reach the North Pole by Smith Sound-Robeson Channel, with exploration of adjacent coasts. HMS Alert (under Captain Nares) wintered at Floeberg Beach, near Cape Sheridan on northeast Ellesmere Island, with sledge parties travelling westward along the north coast, eastward to Greenland, and north towards the North Pole. The HMS Discovery (under Captain H.F. Stevenson) wintered at Discovery Harbour in Lady Franklin Bay, with sledge journeys conducted eastward to Greenland and along its north coast to Sherard Osborn Fiord, south westward on Ellesmere to the head of Archer Fiord, and westward into The Bellows. After the wintering and suffering the ravages of scurvy the expedition returned to England. Includes an account of the 1876 voyage of the Pandora. [AB 452551]



A.B. 6486. Edited (after his death) from Hall's manuscripts, which were published by the U.S. government. This expedition (like that of 1860-62) was supported by private subscription and both were under-taken to search for the records of the Franklin Expedition (contains an engraved portrait of Franklin) and "to promote and benefit the cause of geography, navigation, natural history and science". 
the Cree of the Athabasca. Matonabbee had already been to the Coppermine River, and had established a communication network between the coastal trading posts and the interior. In July 1771, they arrived together at the Coppermine River, a shallow stream interspersed with falls and rapids. At what Hearne would call "Bloody Falls," he witnessed the massacre of Inuit by Matonabbee's men, an event that would haunt him for the rest of his fife. Matonabbee then led Hearne some 45 kilometers south to the elusive copper deposits where Hearne found a piece of copper weighing two kilograms. He returned to Prince of Wales' Fort on June 30, 1772 after having reached further into the subarctic than any European explorer before him. [Smith 26; Peel 3: 41]

On July 17, 1771, Hearne reached the Arctic Ocean, the first European to do so by way of the interior, and claimed the area for the Hudson's Bay Company. He left on his first journey of discovery in November 1769, but returned only a few days later when his Indigenous guide abandoned him in February of 1770. He left again in the company of two Hudson's Bay Cree guides but soon became disoriented and decided to turn back. Their return journey was difficult and full of hardship, en-route all of their equipment, supplies and trade goods were stolen, and Hearne's octant was broken. They reached Hudson's Bay by the end of November, 1770. Twelve days later Hearne set out again, but this time with Chipewyan Chief Matonabbee, who enjoyed great respect within his tribe and among


Among the many portraits of Arctic explorers of the period by Pearce the majority were this half size portrait, while four were the larger three quarter length with an Arctic scene in the background. McClintock portrait was done twice, the half portrait in 1856 and the larger in 1859.

"It is clear that Pearse's portraits constitute a primary source of the greatest importance. The accuracy of his work is attested to by the contemporary naval biographer W.R. 





Originally starting out as a search for Sir John Franklin by way of the Bering Strait, the expedition accomplished what none before had done, the discovery of the North - West Passage, for which McClure and his crew shared the 10,000 pounds offered by the British Government.

Antarctic expedition in 'Erebus' and 'Terror', and here gives the only first hand-published narrative of that expedition other than that of Ross. He had earlier been with Parry's fourth expedition toward the north pole, 1827, and was later with Belcher's 1852-54 Franklin search expedition, and gives a lengthy account of both. Only 750 sets were produced and apparently many were lost.

The large lithographed panoramas of the great ice barrier in the Ross Sea and the coastline of Victoria Land [McCormick] convey the sense of awed wonder experienced by all aboard Ross' ships

when the true enormity of the Antarctic continent revealed itself for the first time" – Comments first edition.

McCormick served as the surgeon during Ross' 1839-43 Antarctic expedition and, although written many years later, his narrative of that remarkable expedition is an important source as it draws from his own diaries penned at the time. The work also covers his other polar expeditions: the first as the surgeon on Parry's 1827 attempt to reach the North Pole and the other on a 1852-53 Franklin search expedition under his own command.

As publication was arranged and paid for by McCormick himself, only 750 sets were produced according to Rosove. He also identifies 7 variant issues, the present set being variant E. M'Cormick was 84 when these memories were published and after five years less than 375 copies had sold. Variants in these attractive cloth bindings indicate that binding work was done in batches. Had a remainders been issued there would have been a number of fine copies on the market over the years, when in fact the reverse has been the case and one can safely assume the unbound sheets were destroyed. Sets in leather bindings would have been from the publishers. Truly fine set would be extremely rare.

We have only four records of this title (cat57-274), however, one was sold to Bert Plimer and years later appeared in the Plimer Catalogue 218. Our first copy came from the fabulous May Fluman collection we bought in c.1979. Also one them, in the very attractive pictorial blue cloth had call numbers on the spines. So really two sets previously.



The `Resolute', under Capt. Kellett, was part of Belcher's five ship expedition. Leaving one




ship, the North Star, at Beechey Island as a base, the other four ships made important explorations as they searched unsuccessfully for Franklin. In May of 1854, convinced that the four ships could not be freed from the ice, Belcher ordered the squadron abandoned. Kellett objected strongly, believing the abandonment premature. Later naval historians have tended to agree with Kellett (cf. DNB). The crews travelled over the ice for two weeks, until they reached the North Star and returned in her to England. The Resolute freed



herself from the ice and drifted unharmed for a thousand miles to Baffin Bay, was found and brought to the U.S. by the whaler `George Henry'. The U.S. Government purchased Resolute and later returned her to England to be presented to Queen Victoria. McDougall's narrative is valuable for its description and attractive plates, including many of the ship, icebergs, etc. He describes how the crew was kept entertained during their wintering in the Arctic, the sledge journeys, encounters with musk oxen, polar bears, etc.

result of his experiences Peary had come to the conclusion that the only practicable means for reaching the North Pole consisted in pushing a ship as far northward as possible to a winter harbor on the Greenland coast, and then early in spring traveling with dogs and sledges due north until the

Pole was attained' (DAB). Peary was undoubtedly the most driven, possibly the most successful, and probably the most unpleasant man in the annals of polar exploration' (Fleming, Ninety Degrees North p284.).


Unlike most previous explorers, Peary studied the Inuit survival techniques, built igloos and dressed in practical furs in the native fashion both for heat preservation and to dispense with the extra weight of tents and sleeping bags when on the march. Peary also relied on the Inuit as hunters and dog-drivers on his expeditions, and pioneered the use of the system (which he called the "Peary system") of using support teams and supply caches for Arctic travel. (Triple sledging had actually been used by the British Franklin rescue missions forty years prior). His wife, Josephine, accompanied him on several of his expeditions. During the course of his explorations, he had eight toes amputated.

Peary was the author of several books, the most famous being Northward over the Great Ice (1898) and The North Pole (1910).
