

Miller 30. Tate Adams made this sequence of wood engravings in Ireland during a visit and, at the same, made the first experimental four-colour linocuts which led to our edition of Riders of Sea, eleven years later.

Tate Adams (1922-2018), Australian artist. 'Soul Cages' was his first published volume of engravings; he was to establish the print department at the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology in 1960, and set up his own Lyre Bird press in 1977. In 2009 he was named a Member of the Order of Australia for 'service to publishing and to the arts, particularly through contributions to the development of printmaking in Australia'.



National Library Ireland online catalogue cites 1 copy. There is only 1 complete copy (of 6 listings) on WorldCat, at University Kansas Libraries. "Originally announced to be in 10 parts but apparently suppressed after 5 parts (see below) were published. A new edition was issued in London, by Henry Coburn & R. Bentley. 1835, in 2 vols, 4to, with 36 portrait plates. Presumably from parts left over from the first edition.


Sir Jonah Barrington, (1760-1834), Irish politician, was appointed an Admiralty Court Judge in 1798. This is an important book for the era covering the subjects of the 1798 Rebellion, The Volunteers and The Union. Barrington's character was called into question but he also on occasions acted with principal. He campaigned against the Union and lost his position when he voted against it. He had helped the government get votes in its favour by bribery. When he lost his seat in 1803 the government made



him a judge. The first part of the present work was published in 1809 causing great alarm because of its uncompromising content and style. It is thought he was induced to delay later parts as the government shrank from exposure of its conduct in carrying out the Act of Union. Financial irregularities forced his removal from the bench but the threat of these memories apparently meant that he was allowed to reside in France from 1815 and act as a judge by deputy until 1830. Contrary to some biographical sources, despite similarities, this is not the same work as his Rise and Fall of the Irish Nation.

"Barrington could have been Solicitor-General if he had agreed to vote for the Union. He gives himself and perhaps deserves great credit for this renunciation, but his political manoeuvres of the period of 1801-2 were far from simple. Between 1805 and 1810 his debts led him to misappropriate court funds and he was finally brought to account for this in 1830. ... All his books are valuable documents for the social and political life of 18th century Ireland. He has been much frowned on by puritan critics but he was simply a politician of his time whose chief fault was to be found out. It is absurd to condemn him for not sharing the high standards of modern Irish political life". - Brady & Cleeve.


The broad collection of portraitures were engraved by James Heath and include Barrington, Edward Fitzgerald, Francis Rawdon, Henry Grattan, Henry Flood, Charles Cornwallis, and others involved in the machinations over Irish Legislative Union.

Todd. Bibliography of Burke. #59. A pamphlet, first published in Ireland in February 1792 and later by Debrett in London. Prominent Irish member of the Irish House of Commons, Sir Hercules Langrische, (1729-1811) was a contemporary and friend of Edmund Burke. This pamphlet is a result of a petition by the Irish Catholic Committee seeking relaxation of the Penal Laws against Catholics. Langrische sought Burke's opinion on the petition, resulting in the published reply. Born in Ireland of a Catholic mother and Protestant father, Edmund Burke was a devoted Anglican but was sympathetic to Roman Catholic issues.





Burke's attack on the leaders and principles of the French Revolution, it is considered his most important book and is a classic of history and politics. It prompted Thomas Paine to respond with his classic Rights of Man. See Printing and the Mind of Man.. Enormously popular, "Reflections" went through eleven editions in little more than a year after appearing first in November 1790. Three editions carry the date 1790.

This first edition bears the points identifying it as a second impression: "M" in date slightly off to the right of the "D' in Dodsley; however the floral printer's ornament point up in the preface, as in the first impression, (iv); p.223, line 23 misprint "ascertainmment"; dagger printer's mark on bottom of p. 194. There is one day difference between the first impression and the second because Burke had the press stopped to make corrections.





"as a public exponent of those principles of Government which have brought our country to her present calamitous condition, by a long course of illiberal legislation and unjustifiable neglect..." An obituary of William Cameron dated Jan. 30, 1869 has been tipped onto the front pastedown.



Kilcullen Road, from Kilcullen town to Nass, Kildare. - Kilcullen Bridge and Old Kilcullen were pivotal to the first toll road in Ireland, founded in 1729, and initially running to "the Bridge at Kilcullen" and later to a point west of this, passing the fair green at Old Kilcullen. The road's administration and maintenance were at times questionable, and amending legislation was made at least twice in its history



Joseph Phillips, a radical and supporter of the 1832 Reform Bill, took the opportunity of the Duke's unsuitable opposition to the same bill, to publish an attack that included the accusation that the Duke was responsible for the death of his servant, Sellis. For this Phillips was jailed.



Henricus Hondius (1597-1651) was a Dutch engraver and mapmaker, a member of a prominent cartographic family. His father, Jodocus Hondius, was also an engraver and geographer. While working with his father, Henricus was instrumental in the expansion and republishing of Mercator's atlas, first published in 1595 and republished by Hondius in 1606. Upon his father's death in 1612, Henricus and his brother, Jodocus the Younger, took over the business. He set up his own shop in 1621, where he continued to release new editions of the Mercator atlas. Later, he partnered with his brother-in-law, Jan Janssonius, in continuing to expand and publish Mercator's atlas, which would become known as the Mercator-Hondius-Janssonius atlas. Born and based in Amsterdam, he died there in 1651.
